



Note: Tracks are now grouped by subcluster and scaled. Switching in subcluster is indicated by changes in track color. Track scale is now set by default to display the region 30 bp upstream of start 1 to 30 bp downstream of the last possible start. If this default region is judged to be packed too tightly with annotated starts, the track will be further scaled to only show that region of the ORF with annotated starts. This action will be indicated by adding "Zoomed" to the title. For starts, yellow indicates the location of called starts comprised solely of Glimmer/GeneMark auto-annotations, green indicates the location of called starts with at least 1 manual gene annotation.
